Streetscape Zones

The Downtown Streetscape will revitalize the central business district for area shops and business to thrive. With this update, we would like to remind our business partners of the purpose for designated zones.

Furnishing/Planting Zone: This zone is defined by 1' x 3' scoring with darker concrete. The width of the zone may vary depending on location, but its color and scoring remain the same to clearly define which area is available for Furnishing/Planting Zone uses. These uses include trees, plantings, pedestrian light poles, bike racks, seating, trash receptacles, public art and any other elements that make the downtown streetscape comfortable and inviting for users.

Pedestrian Zone: The pedestrian zone is a 6' wide thoroughfare that provides straight, unbroken access and is exclusively reserved for pedestrian movement at all times, clear of any obstructions (including furnishings, sandwich boards, planters, etc.). This area is simple concrete, scored in 3' x 3' squares. Two squares (6' width) define the zone that needs to remain clear for pedestrian movement. The City is required to ensure access in this zone.

Frontage Zone is the area immediately adjacent to a building where building entrances are located and activities such as outdoor dining and retail browsing occur. Awnings and architectural canopies may project above the building zone at building entrances and windows. In-ground planting and planted containers may also be located in the building zone, but should be carefully situated as to not block pedestrian or visual access into doors and retail or commercial windows.

Dear Salem Business and Property Owners,

On behalf of the Mayor, City Council and City Manager, I want to thank you for your commitment to operating your business in Historic Downtown Salem. Salem residents are excited by the vibrancy and energy in the downtown business district. Downtown's future is bright with new housing, hotels, an,d businesses recently constructed, underway or planned.

The Downtown Streetscape Plan continues to add to the vibrancy and accessibility in our downtown. In 2020, the City procured private contractors to begin the Council-approved enhancements. Infrastructure improvements include replacement of concrete sidewalks, underground electrical, regrading various curbs and parking areas to accommodate drainage, installation of pedestrian-level lighting and installation of larger tree wells to promote tree health with additional plantings at the base of trees.

Many streetscape improvements are not visible because the work is being done under ground, but you will soon see the community's visioning of wider sidewalks, bike lanes, furnishings, and lighting upgrades which will allow for the ability to hang banners, flags, flower baskets and seasonal decorations. Your assistance in helping us maintain the improvements will be appreciated.

Streetscape Plan Update

Phase I (Completed):

State Street from Front Street to Commercial Street, the north side of Court Street NE from Front Street NE to Commercial Street NE, and the west side of Commercial Street SE from Ferry Street SE to State Street Investment of \$874,993.04

Phase II (Completed):

Commercial Street west side from State Street to Court Street, and Court Street south side from Commercial Street to Front Street. Investment of \$807,215.89.

Phase III (Underway): Anticipated Completion Summer 2023

Both sides of Commercial between Court/Chemeketa, Crews from Gelco Construction Company, the contractor working with the City of Salem's Public Works Department, have mobilized to begin Phase III. Investment of \$1,209,066.50.

Phase IV (Contracted): Anticipated Completion Fall 2023

East side of Commercial between Court and Ferry (Keller contractor).

East side of Commercial between Chemeketa/Center, South side of Chemeketa between Commercial/Front (WestTech).
